Night/The Sunflower (Holocaust) Presentations

Assignment:

Step 1) Identify what you to believe to be a central issue/theme in the book *Night/The Sunflower*.

Step 2) Write the theme/issue in a complete sentence. ("Racism," for example, is not a theme. "Remarkable courage is needed to stand up to the evils of racism" is a theme.

Step 3) Analyze how the theme/issue is developed in the memoir.

Step 4) Find two or more examples of the theme/issue in some other medium or genre. One of these examples must a nonfiction (news) source. The other example should be something like a song, a piece of art, a movie, a speech, a poem, book, etc. Both examples must be found in the contemporary world (2000-now). Make sure both examples underscore your theme/issue.

Step 5) Prepare a 4-5 minute presentation in which you discuss the importance of your theme/issue in the book and demonstrate how it relates to at least two other modern examples. I am intentionally not giving you more direction than that because I do not want to stifle your creativity. You can make a film, create art, write a song, give a lecture, or anything else that conveys the universality of your theme/issue. Make sure that any technology based presentations (film, powerpoint, pictures, etc.) are saved to teacher share before class starts on the day of your presentation.
